### **MTC Co-founders Reflect on 25 Years**



entor Tutor Connection was thrilled to honor co-founders Marge Bruno and Bob Adams at our 25th Anniversary Celebration on October 2. Over 100 members of the MTC community gathered to pay tribute to them and to share stories of the thousands of students and volunteers who have participated over the years.

Marge Bruno spoke about her first meeting as Los Altos Rotary president in 1996 where she told her fellow Rotarians how important it is to give their time to support kids as she passed around a pad of paper. "To my amazement, at the end of the meeting we had 50 who signed up to be tutors!" Soon after, volunteers were supporting students at Santa Rita and Almond elementary schools and at Los Altos High School.

Fortuitously, Bob Adams followed Marge as Rotary President the next year. He was inspired by Marge and suggested that they add a mentoring component to the program. Bob was the basketball coach at Alta Vista High School where he developed positive relationships with the players and saw

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the value of a caring adult in a young person's life.

"Rotary was a great catalyst for bringing projects like this to the forefront," Bob said. "We have a community that has shown up in spades to honor these commitments to our youngsters."

Both Marge and Bob thanked the hundreds of volunteers who have made their vision a reality over these 25 years. In retrospect, we see that Marge and Bob launched not only an organization, but also a community culture of connection and belonging that still exists today.

This is the case for MTC Board member Joan Barram and her student, Melanie. When Melanie was in 6th grade at Santa Rita in Los Altos, Joan was assigned as her tutor through MTC. Now, three years later, Melanie is a freshman at Los Altos High School, and the two are sticking together by joining MTC's Mentor Program.



As Melanie progressed through the grades, Joan found herself relearning polynomials and quadratic equations in order to be supportive. Melanie would frequently ask for help studying for a test, and Joan was always there for her. Joan believed it was her role to, "...remind Melanie that she's capable, and be there when she had a question to ask or a problem to solve."

Joan treasures a note she received from Melanie which said, "When you help me, I feel more confident and strong." Joan can't imagine what more anyone could want for a few hours a week!

Now, as mentor and mentee, Joan and Melanie are enjoying new activities together. They recently spent a Saturday at Stanford University visiting the Papua New Guinea Sculpture Gardens. Joan looks forward to spending the high school years with Melanie and seeing where this new relationship takes them.

s we think back on all the students MTC has served over the past 25 years, we often wonder, "Where are they now?" Hearing their stories and seeing where these "kids" are today brings the original vision for MTC into reality.

We have been inspired to reconnect with Khris Sandifer who came to Alta Vista full of skepticism and distrust 20 years ago. There, he found a caring, empowering community. When he joined the basketball team, he met "Coach" (a.k.a. Bob Adams) who took him

under his wing. Khris was then matched with a mentor who encouraged his talent in photography and gave him the confidence to pursue it.

Today, Khris has a production company and has received many awards for his photography, but he is most proud of co-founding a tech school in East Palo Alto that teaches coding, web development and design where he enjoys supporting local youth.

Khris not only produced MTC's 25th Anniversary video, but he also spoke at our event where he reflected on what he learned through the Mentor Program. "The beauty is that you can see something in an individual they might not see, and when you find that gift and see them grow, it's an honorable thing."

Khris is now a mentor to many young people through his work and volunteerism. He will never forget that people took time to mentor him and help him find his gift. He told the audience, "It's like planting a seed, eventually it becomes an orchard."

## Mentor Tutor Connection: The Impact We've Achieved Together

Due to the COVID pandemic and distance learning, MTC shifted to remote tutoring and mentoring. As a result, we served fewer students this year, but we delivered significantly more volunteer hours to those students! We are so grateful to our tutors and mentors.

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
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
